# "Against the Wall" speaking tour - additional details for US groups

Proposed dates: February 15-29th 2012

#### Nature of the talks

They are about 35-45 minutes long and I give a brief history of Banksy's 2007 Santa's Ghetto project (see http://www.guardian.co.uk/artanddesign/artblog/2007/dec/03/banksyinbethlehem), and how I came to do the book. I then talk the audience through the various styles and themes of graffiti that are on the wall and use these as 'mirrors' to tell the stories of people who are caught behind it. So, for example, a common theme is getting over/around the wall. I show some street art images related to this and then give stories of people trying to get across the wall for work, to reach their farm land, to holy sites in Jerusalem, etc (see images below). It's a highly visual talk peppered with stories and facts about the wall, emphasizing the human stories – a format that countless attendees have said is a powerful and effective means of communicating the reality on the ground.

Most places hold a Q&A afterwards, which I'm happy to do, as well as any local media opportunities, should your groups want to send out press releases to generate publicity.



### **Costs and accommodation options**

I work with advocacy groups in the UK regularly and know that many don't have much funding. I am currently asking some individuals in the US with money to cover my daily, internal transportation, accommodation and flight costs. The publisher can contribute \$500 to my London-US airfare. Fingers crossed...

If that doesn't cover all basic expenses, I would be requesting a daily honorarium of \$250 (i.e. if I squeeze in two talks in a day, then \$125 each). I would be happy for groups to produce posters or postcards for sale of any of the images from the book to help off-set costs. You can also purchase discounted copies of the book from Lawrence Hill, the publisher, and sell them at the event to generate additional income. The organizers of my Canadian tour (CJPME) did this with the posters and books, selling out of 500 books before the 6 events had been completed. These are all modest income generators, but they all help.

As I've done with other groups in the UK and Ireland, I would be happy to accept accommodation in activists' homes if that's an option to reduce that expense – it's always a great way to make contacts, network and get to know people who are doing great grassroots work.

### Side options – photo exhibitions and wall projections

My book launch in the UK was hosted by Amnesty International at their London HQ to an audience of 350 people. Amnesty also held an exhibition for a week of photos from the book. Amnesty subsequently recommended the talks to all of its UK branches and offices in Europe. London's Tottenham Palestine Literature Festival also had a photo exhibition of images in September here in north London, as did the LUSH Festival in the summer in Dorset. University student groups and advocacy groups have also organized photo exhibitions with my images, often during Israeli Apartheid Week. I am happy to provide the images as electronic files but groups interested would have to cover the printing and mounting costs (I use a 5mm foam board backing).

If you are interested in this idea, you will need a sufficiently powerful projector, a generator to run it (or socket access), light-colored wall space with minimal ambient lighting – and to check the situation with local laws concerning public-space projections.
