

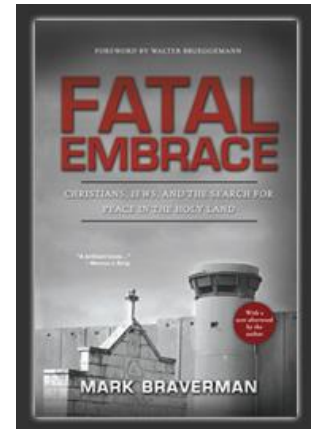
Mark Braverman: Peace for Israel/Palestine

Mark Braverman is a Jewish American with deep family roots in the Holy Land. Mark was reared in the Jewish tradition, studied Bible, Hebrew literature, and Jewish history, and is trained in clinical psychology and crisis management. Traveling to Israel/Palestine in 2006, he was transformed by witnessing the Israeli occupation of Palestine and by encounters with diverse peace activists—Jewish, Christian, and Muslim. Dr. Braverman now devotes himself full-time to writing, advising, speaking, and action towards a just peace in the Holy Land, with a focus on religious beliefs and interfaith relations. He is a charter member of American Jews for a Just Peace. His widely read book *Fatal Embrace* will soon appear in its third edition.
